Dear Friends

I am writing this in mid-September. The school have been back for 2 weeks, leaves on trees are turning yellow and the frost has turned the heating on in church last night. Autumn seems here.



Autumn heralds our Harvest Thanksgiving services. The Bible readings this year include Psalm 126 which people would sing as they walked up to the Temple. They would remember the hard times and the tears with seeds to sow. They would anticipate the good times, with joy and sheaves of grain. The gospel is Matthew 6 where Jesus encourages his first hearers to not worry but instead trust God for the things they need.

These are simple words to say, but difficult to practice. Some of us are natural worriers. For many, life is very tough at the moment. We are distracted by the stresses of life, and the "stuff" that needs to be done.

It is easy to forget that God loves us more than we can imagine. Harvest invites to lift our eyes to see God at work, to pause in the busyness of life, to reflect and worship God and to anticipate his Kingdom.

Harvest is also an opportunity to express our thanks and praise to God by giving special gifts e.g. tinned or dried foodstuffs which are given to local charities. Other ways include contributing to the Teams4U Shoe box appeal 2024, (see church NIPs) or to give to the RBL at our Remembrance services. These special offerings are in addition to our regular giving to local churches, which is an act of worship symbolising the commitment of our lives to God.

Let us be known as kind, generous and thankful people, echoing our offertory communion prayer...

NOTES:

* **W4A = Worship for All.** A service particularly suitable for children to attend. It is in the context of Communion in Tutbury, and Service of the Word in Rolleston and Anslow. There is usually an activity pack (a wordsearch, crossword, a colouring sheet, a craft related to the service theme) to take home or do in church after the service.

Midweek Communion - Rolleston Thursdays at 9.30am - Common Worship Holy Communion. This is followed by Coffee Club, 10am to 11.30am in the OGSR.

Thinking Aloud

It can be puzzling when we first begin to read the bible.... so many words. "Bible" means library. The Bible has 66 books within it. An informative overview of the whole bible, in my opinion, is the Lion Handbook of the Bible.



If you want to start reading the bible for yourself, I suggest you start with the New Testament – the four gospels, then Acts then the letters e.g. Ephesians or James. It is often helpful when we are focussing on a specific book or letter in the Bible to look at what other people have said about it. My default theologian for the New Testament is Tom Wright for New Testament books – especially his "Everyone" series.

When we sit down to read the bible, it is helpful to start with a short prayer.... "please God, speak to me through your Word today. Amen"

The following sets of questions can help us reflect on what we are reading and discerning what God might be saying to us.

e.g. question set one:

- What does the passage say?
- What does the passage mean?
- What does this passage mean for me?

e.g. question set two:

The Bible Course suggested the following questions to ask ourselves.

- WHAT? What did this passage mean in its original context?
- SO WHAT? What does this passage mean in the light of Jesus?
- NOW WHAT? What does this passage mean for my life today?

When putting the Bible text in context e.g. when reading the Old Testament the Bible Course leaders suggested we find out....

- When was this passage written?
- What was the historical context?
- Who were the intended audience?
- Why was this message important?

When I am working in groups, the below can help us reflect on God's word. I find the final question in this set to be the most challenging.

Optional Reflection - spoken, silent or shared:

1. The context of our reading(s)?
2. What phrase(s) or word(s) seem key?
3. If this is the word of the Lord, which is meant to change our lives, how will our lives change in the next few days (or weeks, months or years) having heard it?

Tutbury WI

Our September speaker was Gay Evans who has been a family historian for over 37 years. She spoke about "Forgotten Woman" of the Pastures hospital Mickleover. Her talk was fascinating telling us how when researching her family tree, she came upon a relative called Emma who was born in 1884. She was married to Steven who was a clay miner and had 6 children. She explained that in those days there was a stigma attached to Asylums and family members were put in there as a last resort. Ledgers are kept in the Derby archives office, and she told us in Emma's entry it stated she had been ill for 6 months before being/

/.... committed. It was stated that her illness was related to childbirth. She sadly told us that Emma died in the asylum having resided there for 48 years. It states in the ledgers (which were written quarterly) that she was only fit for a fireside existence.

Gay also told us about other woman that she had come across who also resided at the asylum in the 1800's. Some of the ladies recovered and were sent home to their families. It was a very interesting and informative talk giving us a brief insight into day-to-day life of the asylum from the activities that were on offer to jobs, wages and food that was available to the patients

Benefice Recipe

The simple recipe this month has been doing the rounds in Tutbury MU. It is really simple and as I (the editor) can attest, tastes gorgeous in slices spread with butter....

Recipe

1lb (450g) mixed
dried fruit

1 egg

6oz (150g) Self-
raising flour

Just over 3/4 mug of black tea



Method:

Soak the dried fruit in tea overnight in a covered bowl

Mix all the ingredients and put into a greased loaf tin and bake at 180deg C for 40 minutes



The mixture should drop off the spoon. If necessary, add one or two teaspoons of water

When cool, wrap in foil and put into the fridge to keep moist.

The cake can be frozen when sliced and wrapped in cling film, if you wish.

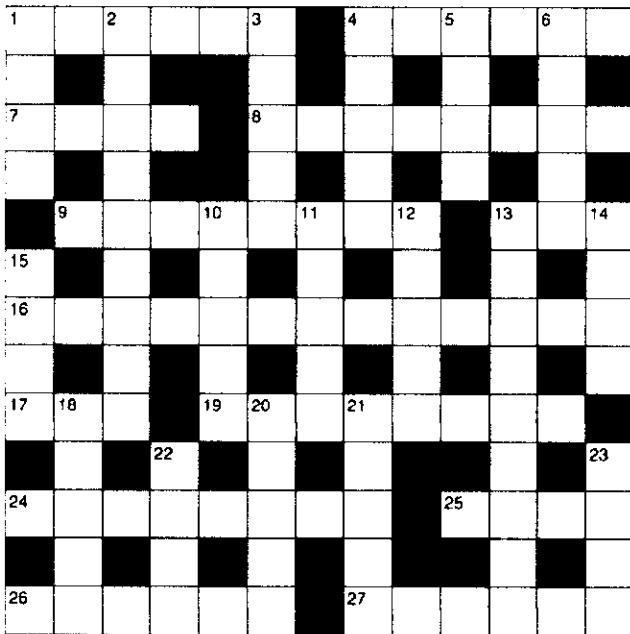

TUTBURY CHURCHYARD

Future burials

As most people will realise, space in the current churchyard, in common with many others in England, is fast running out of space. The Parochial Church Council has considered where future burials should take place. It is proposed to use an area to the north and east side of the church for re-burials and although there are graves there, most are more than 75 years old. This area is shown shaded on the attached plan. A small area would also be created as a children's area.

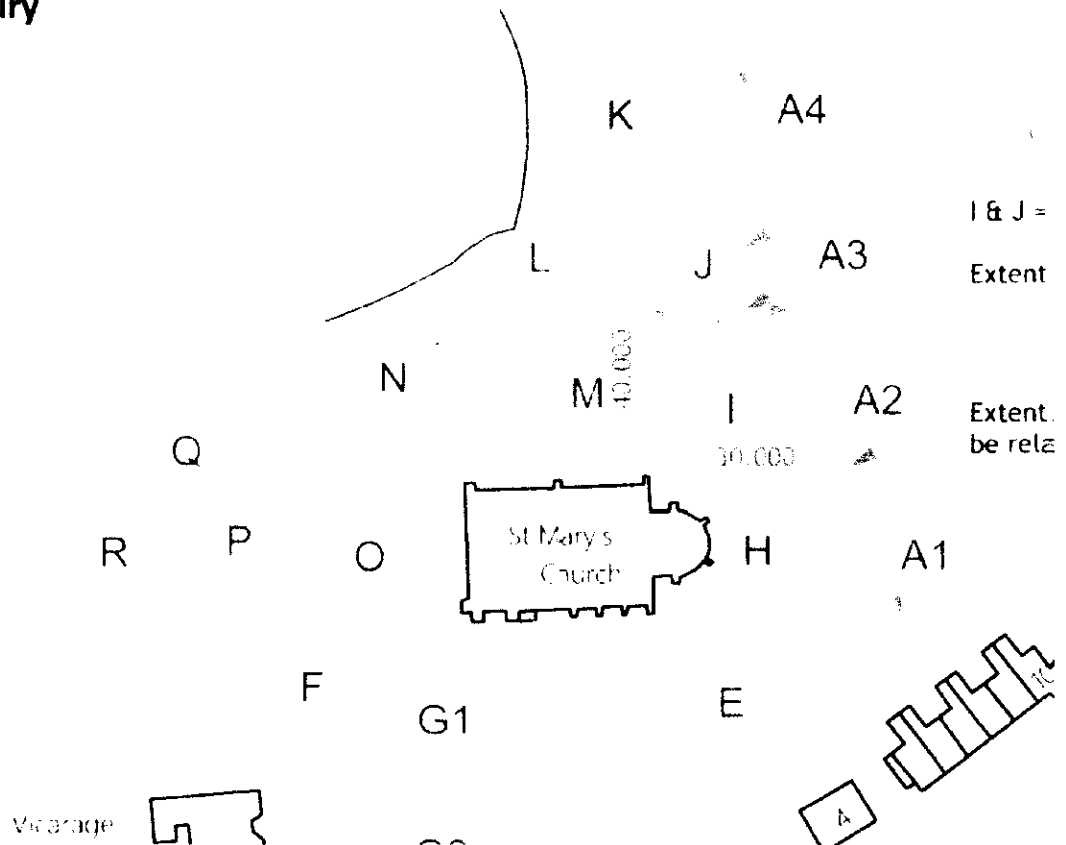
The re-use of churchyards is generally encouraged as space for interment is limited and whilst there is no comprehensive guidance, local circumstances may vary from parish to parish.

Land may be re-used for burials where graves are more than 75 years old but care will be required. The re-use of land will be generally permissible where graves are 100 years old. No existing gravestones or memorials would be removed.

The existing path would be upgraded and a new one laid to the new burial area. It is suggested that this be a type of mesh so that grass can grow through it. Should anyone have any observations of the proposals, these should be received by the Parochial Church Council by **31st January 2025**.
