Dear Friends

It is with mixed emotions that I write this my final pastoral letter of the ART Magazine. Years ago a retiring clergyman commented to me, "clergy are like Marmite – some people love us, and some people don't!". I have found this to be true in the five years in the ART Benefice. Never before have I experienced such polarised attitudes, words and behaviours.



I still believe this was where God called me to minister when I applied then was interviewed, appointed and licensed in 2019. I have so many wonderful memories of "God moments"; child and adult baptisms, beaming smiles as couples marry, tears of sadness shared when loved ones die, and leading poignant funerals of babies, children and adults. We experienced Covid together – Facebook and live streaming, take-home Lent bags, Advent windows and W4A Activity kits. We turned Christmas trees into Lent Crosses then Pentecost fires.

I have been privileged to lead, several Bible Courses and the Prayer Course. I have seen people becoming more confident in prayer and in their understanding of God's Word. I have loved our systematic approach of services and sermons based on the Lectionary and our summer "Heroes of faith". I hear people saying "God moment" or "God-coincidence" in everyday conversations. I too have grown in my faith.

I can testify to the love and sustaining power of God, experienced through the Holy Spirit, in my own life as well in the lives of many others.

All human beings, and maybe clergy more than most, will let us down. They will do things we disagree with or misunderstand. They will not fulfil our expectations. They, or we, will leave, moving to another physical place or into glory – to be in God's eternal presence. An Anglican funeral prayer feels appropriate as I end this letter and my time here.

Heal the memories of hurt and failure.

Give us the wisdom and grace to use aright the time that is left to us here on earth, to turn to Christ and follow in his steps in the way that leads to everlasting life.

Ultimately, it is all about Jesus. I commend Him to you.

So we mourn not the past nor dread the future but open ourselves to the possibilities of compassion, of kindness, of humility, of gentleness, of patience, opening ourselves to the possibility of God bringing life in all its fullness.

Hand in hand with God, we step into a brave new future.

You are invited to 24 hours of prayer



This was first suggested in a Rolleston "James" home group, which in turn grew out of the Lent 2024 Prayer Course.

- The idea is to have a focussed 24-hour of prayer, the aims being:
- to commit ourselves to God in the season of Advent,
- to pray about our guest Christmas school and church services and
- to set the foundations for a prayerful vacancy in 2025.

The "24 hours" will begin with our morning Communion services on Sunday 15 December. It will include BCP Evensong at 6.30pm.

There will be other prayer activities lasting about 15 minutes in the lady chapel of St Mary's, Rolleston. These will be at 12 noon, 2pm, 4pm and 8pm with Compline at 10pm, and may include listening to music, reading a psalm, a meditation, a poem, or contemplative silent prayer.

Please note, you are NOT expected to attend every prayer moment.

During the night, if you wake up, you might want to say the Lord's Prayer before going back to sleep. We end the "24 hours" with Morning Prayer at 8am and a Benefice Communion at 10am in the Lady chapel in Rolleston on the Monday, then coffee and biscuits in the Rectory.

You might also like to consider fasting. "Fasting" can be going without all food, or maybe just restricting yourself to plain food, or no alcohol, or chocolate, or no TV or social media for those 24 hours. Fasting has not been written out of the spiritual disciplines for followers of Jesus Christ!

Philippians 4:6-7

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

The "James" groups 2024 / 25

Further to the Prayer Course earlier this year, those attending said they wanted to keep meeting together. We have setting up fortnightly "Home Groups", again on 2 times of a week, usually in the Rectory. The groups are looking at the letter of James, developing the theme of our Sunday sermons in September.

All are welcome to these groups. You can join any time.

The format is:

- Coffee or tea
- Opening worship eg listening to song(s) or music or reading a Psalm to help us worship and giving praise and thanksgiving to God.
- Read the bible passage and discuss it using the Tom Wright notes.
- A prayer activity e.g. Post-it notes, contemplation, etc

Recipe

4 oz 125 g margarine 2 level tbsps (30ml) golden syrup 4 oz 125 g SR flour

2 oz 60 g sugar

2 small eggs



Method


Cream margarine, sugar & golden syrup together.

Seive flour


Beat eggs

Stir eggs & flour alternately into creamed mixture

Put into greased & floured 6 inch (15cm) round cake tin and bake for approximately 75mins in centre of preheated oven 325F (160C or 140C fan) (gas Mk3)




Phyllis in Retirement
