## A Summer of Extremes

Until yesterday (12 August - the hottest day of 2024), it seemed that summer had "failed to download". July temperatures were 2.4°C lower than average. Cool, cloudy and wet aren't ideal conditions for barbecues, festivals or sporting events.



It seems a summer of extremes in politics and conflicts too. It is just 6 weeks since the UK's general election and Labour's massive majority. Across the Atlantic, the Democrats endorsing the highest-ranking female in US history as the potential first woman leader of the free world, and a past and possibly future president found guilty of a hush money scandal then gaining increased poll ratings by surviving an assassination attempt.

The Middle East conflict is escalating with the involvement of Lebanon and Hezbollah, and the ongoing pursuit of Hamas by Israel in Gaza resulting in Palestinian civilians deaths. The conflict between Russian and Ukraine continues with this week's possibly surprise invasion into Russia territory.

Simultaneous to these and other wars, we may have watched the Olympics, sporting excellence, achieved by years of disciplined training, competitors from many nations celebrating together, hugging in shared joy and in disappointment. In the same week, we watched the news of 3 young girls murdered at a dance workshop, the perpetrator wrongly identified as an illegal asylum seeker which triggered Far Right rioters to turn in anger on those perceived to be "the other", violent disorder fuelled by racism and misinformation on social media, the press and even by politicians.

We may be tempted to judge, but are we totally innocent? Do we sometimes believe gossip and lies, repeating them without finding out the true story? Do we form impressions of others without attempting to understand their experience or point of view? To what extent do we show the love of God in everything we say and do?

Jesus said: 'In everything, treat people the same way you want them to treat you.' (Matthew 7:12). "As I have loved you, so you must love one another". John 13:34.

Loving isn't always easy. We can find it hard to love those who are different to us, or whom we struggle to understand but it can be done. When we take time to get to know "the other" and discover a little of what it's like to walk in their shoes, prejudices and fear can be replaced by empathy, compassion and care, and so we discover our shared humanity as people created in God's image.

May this be our experience for the sake of the Kingdom of God in this place.

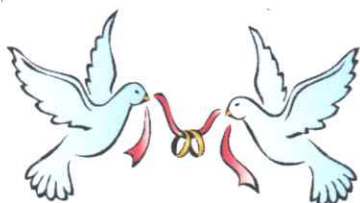

# Thinking Aloud

When we walk in this relationship with God,

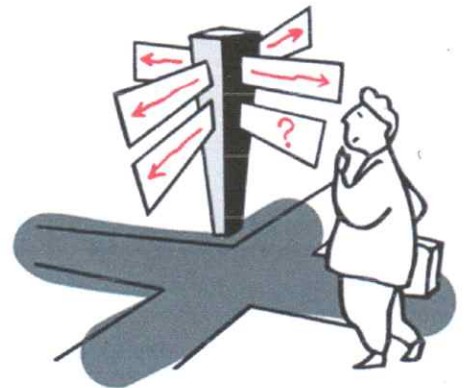
- reading    Commanding Scripture)

**Benefice Recipe** - Our Benefice Recipe this month is great as a main meal or snack - hot or cold with veg or salad.

### Scottish Beef Roll

#### Recipe:

200g streaky bacon  
450g raw minced beef  
1 large carrot  
100g porridge oats  
15ml Worcestershire sauce  
Salt and pepper  
Pinch of mixed herbs  
1 egg  
Browned breadcrumbs

#### Method:

Grease a large piece of foil.  
Peel the onion and chop finely. Put into mixing bowl with the mince. Remove the rind from the bacon and cut into small pieces and then add to the mixture. Add the oats, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper and herbs.  
Beat the egg in a basin and then pour into the mixture and blend well.  
Turn out mixture onto the prepared foil and form into a 6in/15cm long roll .....

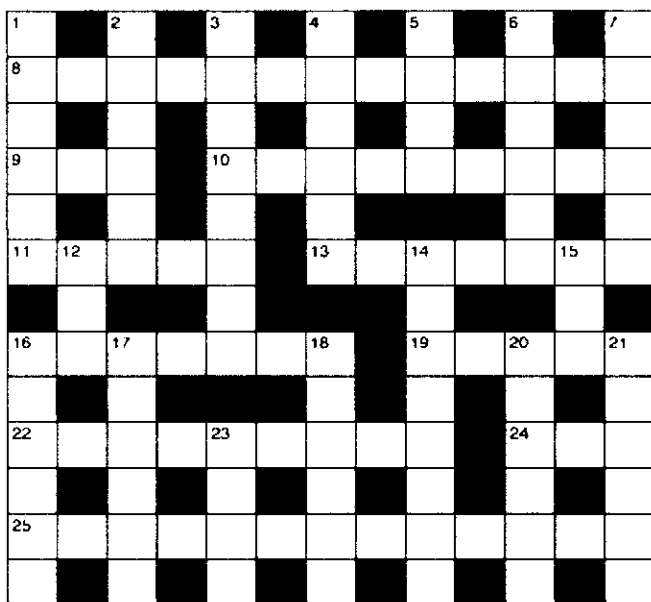

Wrap well and place on a baking sheet and bake at 330degF/150degC/GasMk2 for 2 hours. Leave to cool for 15 minutes then press browned breadcrumbs all over the roll.

Leave until completely cold, then cover roll loosely with foil and chill in the Fridge.

### Serving suggestions:

*Serve cold* - Cut beef roll into thick slices and serve with various salads or pickles  
*Serve hot* - cut into thick slices: grill or fry for about 5 mins on each side till brown. Serve with hot veg, or in buttered rolls for a quick snack.
