

My Friends

As the Benefice is in vacancy and realistically, is likely to be so for some little time, many more of us will have to step up to the mark and do things we wouldn't normally do. It is in this vein that, as a PCC member at Tutbury as well as being the parish's Safeguarding Officer, I am having a go at writing this Pastoral letter this month.



My main theme, as kindly suggested by Reverend Dave who is recovering from his knee replacement operation, is co-operation, sharing and understanding. In this month when Lent begins, we remember the difficult journey Jesus made to the cross, to take upon Himself our sins and the sins of the whole world, to bring us the hope of eternal life by His resurrection.

News and Views

The Crisis in our A & E Departments

Reform the NHS, or half the population could end up in A&E. That is the dire warning of the medical director for NHS in England.

Sir Stephen Powis says that the health service must 'go for broke' in delivering more care outside of hospitals, if the A&E system is not to face a total collapse. There are simply too many of us turning up at A&E departments.

Looking ahead, Sir Stephen, the top doctor in England warns: "If A&E attendances increase at the same rate as they have over the past 10 years, NHS staff will need to manage six million more A&E attendances every year from 2034.

In the end, that would mean "the equivalent of almost half the population attending A&E at least once every year – that is not feasible for a 21st-century health system. Instead, millions of patients will need to receive the care and support they need outside of a hospital."

Sir Stephen's warning came in a recent speech to the Liverpool Medical Institution.

A Lent Reflection

Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!' Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine sonship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, 'who am I? It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

However, please do not use them for other items such as paper, artificial flowers and the like. As you will know, the Council have a strict policy of not collecting brown bins with such contaminants. So, please take these contaminants home to dispose properly in your own grey or blue bins.

He informed us that, sadly, whilst the Rotary Club is no longer running Aquabox is a thriving community project with over 70 volunteers who come to their depot each week to, assemble, test and pack the family filters as well as Aqua-Aid boxes./

Colin explained in the beginning the Rotary Club were packing plastic crates with a tap and chlorine tablets that when empty could be used to produce safe drinking water and about 10 years ago they were introduced to John Griffith who had created a hand pumped water filter. He explained it works by a central core of straws which traps the impurities and releases the clean water.

Colin informed the members that Aquabox filters and Aquabox-Aid boxes, have been distributed around the world to countries suffering from natural and man-made disasters providing safe drinking water to hundreds of thousands of people.

Colin shows us the contents of an Aqua-Aid box which costs £150 to fill and have the basics in that a family would need.

Colin invited our members to come and see the work they do at the factory in Wirksworth, and we are planning a trip for later in the year.

2025 – Time for a New Church Electoral Roll

It happens in the Church of England every six years. Whereas for five years, the Electoral Roll is revised annually our Electoral Roll Officer, in this sixth year, the roll is dissolved, and we must all re-apply and re-commit ourselves.

It is in each parish's interest for the future of that parish to ensure that all persons who want to be included in future, are included.

Shortly, each parish's nominated Electoral Roll Officer (usually a Churchwarden) will be distributing Electoral Roll forms to their congregation for filling in and collection.

If you know of someone who is unable to be in church at the time of form filling, do please ask the Electoral Roll Officer or one of the Churchwardens for a form for you to pass on to that person.

Benefice Recipe

I trust that our recipe contributions on this page over the months, are useful to readers who are either budding cooks, people on their own who need something simple or cooks who have become bereft of ideas for something quick and easy to make but tasty. Last month, we featured Puff Bread Pockets for lunch on the go. This month, we feature

Cheesy Fondue Surprise

This is another great lunch snack or for a supper in among friends or family. No faff with a fondue set is required!

INGREDIENTS

25g Butter

1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped

1 red pepper, de-seeded and diced into small diamonds

4 spring onions, trimmed and thickly sliced

2 level teaspoons cornflour

1/2 pint semi-skimmed milk

1 level Tsp made English mustard

227g packet smoked pork sausage, sliced

75g Gruyère cheese, grated

75g Cheddar Cheese grated

To serve:

75g butter, softened

1 level tablespoon tomato purée

1 level teaspoon mixed dried herbs

6 bagels, sliced in half

PREPARATION

- Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the onion and fry for 2 minutes on a gentle heat until softened and transparent.
 Add the pepper and spring onions and fry for a further minute.
- Mix the cornflour with a little of the milk to form a smooth paste./

Add the remaining milk and mustard to the saucepan and bring to the boil.




Simmer and add in the cornflour and mix well.

- 4. Add the sliced sausage and continue to simmer for 2 minutes or until thickened.
- 5. Remove from the heat and and add both grated cheeses. Stir until melted.
- Meanwhile, mix the butter, tomato purée and herbs together. Spread a little over each bagel half and toast under a medium hot grill.
- 7. To serve, spoon the fondue mixture on to each bagel half.


